To the High School Associations:

As will be seen from the reports given in this Bulletin, the high school contests in the several districts and in the state meeting were the best in the history of the Associations. The Associations have clearly justified their usefulness.

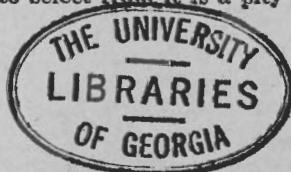
The annual conferences were well attended and helpful programs were carried out. We print this year as careful review of these discussions as could be obtained. While over one hundred were in attendance this year, we hope to see the number enrolled in each conference increase until each will embrace the majority of the teachers engaged in that department of instruction.

The different departments group about the general meeting for a week's study and discussion. Annual committees were appointed to report on different lines of investigation at the next annual meeting. These reports and synopsis of the discussions, as in the Mathematics conference this year, will be printed in the annual Bulletin.

We hope to see great interest manifested in the silver badge contests this year. The high schools should enlist the interest of the ladies of the town in providing horizontal bars, parallel bars, and other apparatus for the grounds. The day is past for play grounds unprovided with the necessary apparatus for profitable sport. Basket ball, a track, and a baseball ground should be provided also.

Every boy in the high school should be required to make a record twice a year in the track events and his record posted. The boy needing exercise most is the very one that will neglect it. In our climate outdoor drills can be carried on throughout the year. Wholesome, carefully supervised athletics does not injure the school work, but helps the school and the pupil.

I hope all expecting to enter literary contests will read the admirable paper by Miss Carolyn Cobb found in this Bulletin. With the great abundance of good literature to select from it is a pity for



a pupil to waste time upon a trashy selection. I believe it would be a real gain for the boy to select for declamation a passage from the thousands of great speeches that have come down to us.

All of the musical selections this year were from standard composers. We were spared the rag-time.

The rules of the association are stated in the Bulletin and are binding upon all who expect to enter for the state contests. The officers are expected to see that the rules are enforced. Eligibility blanks will be sent to each school early in the spring. The president should permit no one to appear in the district contests that is not properly certified on the official blanks. The executive committee, at the last annual meeting, insisted that the rules be enforced by each district committee and the state committee. There has been a tendency to modify the rules to suit a local convenience. For instance, if some boy has a speech twelve minutes long, his teacher would move that the eight minute rule be suspended. Under the rules this cannot be done, and if so the contestant would not be eligible for the state contests, as he did not comply with the regulations governing such contests.

All eligibility blanks should be kept by the secretary of the district associations so that he may be able to fill out eligibility blanks for the state contests. A committee from the state executive committee will examine these. Where a hundred or more meet in these contests it is absolutely necessary that all conform to the same general rules, if satisfaction is to be secured.

It will be noted that the associations have undertaken to supervise all the inter-school athletics, so as to secure bona fide students and fairness. We believe that the number of out of town games should be carefully regulated by each school so as to avoid needless distraction from the serious work of the school. These games are not the business of the pupil but his play after creditable work.

In the election of officers for 1912-13 care should be taken to reorganize according to the twelve new Congressional Districts created by the General Assembly in 1911. Where no material difference occurs the district officers might conform to the new order this year, if a school prefers to make the change now. Application should be made to the President of the District.

#### **CONSTITUTION—As Adopted by the State Meeting July 7, 1909.**

Section 1. The JUNIOR, MIDDLE and SENIOR High Schools of the..... Congressional District shall constitute the ..... District High School Association of Georgia.

All High Schools holding membership in the District Associations are members of the State Association.

Sec. II. The object of the association shall be to promote the cause of education, through the establishment and adequate maintenance and equipment of public high schools in every county, as a necessity in any modern system of education, a right of every boy and girl, rural and urban, and an efficient means of linking the elementary public schools with the colleges and universities and of improving the scholarship of the rank and file of High School teachers, and the intelligence and efficiency of the entire citizenship of the State.

Sec. III. The membership of the Association shall include all teachers and officers in the above mentioned high schools, the boards of trustees of said schools, and the county school commissioners of the counties in each district.

Sec. IV. Each school shall have one vote, and a majority of the schools represented shall constitute a quorum, at a regular or duly called special meeting.

Sec. V. Conferences shall be held annually on the..... and on the..... The executive committee will arrange the program for these and send it to all the members.

Sec. VI. Annual contests in declamation, recitation, music, written spelling, etc., and track athletics, that will promote the cause of

education shall be held during the spring term, either for the whole district or in such sub-divisions of the district as the association may determine. But the state organization, with the exception of the 11th District, which may form two associations, must keep intact, according to the congressional districts. Winners of the district contests may be sent to the annual state contest during the sessions of the State Summer School.

Sec. VII. Delegates from the association shall be sent to the annual convention of the **GEORGIA EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION**, and to the **STATE HIGH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION**, held during the State Summer School.

Sec. VIII. The officers of this association shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer. These, with two others, shall constitute the district executive committee. The state officers shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and an executive committee, consisting of the presidents of the eleven district associations and state officers.

**BY-LAWS.**

The high schools of each county in the.....district shall have the right to send one boy and one girl, to contest in declamation and recitations, respectively; one boy and one girl to participate in ready writers' contest, based upon subjects selected from the College Entrance Requirements in English for 1909-'12; to submit specimens of high school pupils' handiwork; one contestant in piano music; one contestant in spelling, and to send not exceeding five boys to contest in different forms of track athletics, all of whom must be bona fide students of the school and in good standing for the school year. Contestants must not have passed their nineteenth birthday at the time of the district meeting.

2. Any one who has won a prize in any of the above contests is ineligible to the same contest any other year.

3. The several associations shall charge an admission fee of..... cents for school children and..... for others to the contests, the proceeds to go to defraying the expenses of judges, printing, delegates to the state meetings, etc., and \$5.00 for annual Bulletin.

4. There shall be three judges for each contest and one time-keeper.

5. Judges shall be elected by the executive committee from names furnished by the several county committees, from persons not connected with the schools contesting, unless agreed upon by all the executive committee.

6. No speech, recitation or music selection shall be longer than eight minutes, and no essay longer than five hundred words. All handiwork must be the work of the pupil, done as a part of the regular school exercises. Contestants in music must be bona fide

members of music department in high school classes of their schools. Track contests must conform to the standard rules governing same, as explained in "Spaulding's Official Handbook Public School Athletic League" where they do not conflict with these by-laws. 8. The state executive committee shall prepare a uniform schedule of contests for all districts, and the state association and the several executive committees will determine what the prizes shall be for each contest.

9. The principal of the school must certify to the president of the district association the names, ages, time in school and scholarship of contestants one week before contest, on eligibility blanks prepared by the state executive committee, and no one will be allowed to contest who is not thus certified to and who does not conform to the By-Laws and Constitution.

10. The district committee should be instructed to name the alternates for the state contests from the next highest contestants.

11. A loving cup, a perpetual trophy, shall be offered by the state association for the district winning the greatest number of points in the athletic contests, the cup going to the school, for the year, winning the most of the winning points. The winning district will each year be engraved on the cup. A similar cup shall be offered, under similar conditions to the district winning the greatest number of points in the literary contests.

II. Where several high schools are in one county, these may contest or otherwise agree among themselves for the honor of representing the county in the district contest. The principals of the high schools of the county may constitute an executive committee for said county.

III. It is recommended that each county and city hold annual contests and exhibitions among elementary school pupils under the direction of the county teachers' association and the high school authorities are requested to cooperate with the county authorities in organizing the same.

#### AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS—Made at the Annual Meeting, 1910.

1. On motion of K. T. Alfriend it was decided that the prize essay for each district be sent, just as it is handed to the committee of the district contest, to the president of the State Association instead of having the children come to Athens, and that judges for these papers be selected as the other judges for the state contests.

2. On motion made and carried it was decided that all Districts be required to use the same four books for the essays selected from the College Entrance Requirements.

3. Motion made and carried that the state executive committee fix the following track events and that no other events be allowed at the State meet: 100-yd. Dash; 220-yd. Dash, 440-yd. Dash, 120-yd. Low Hurdle (two and half feet), Shot Put (12lb.), Running Broad Jump, Running High Jump, Half Mile Relay Race.

4. Motion made and carried that if contestant is not present at time announced for the contest, no special after consideration shall be given such pupil.

The High School Speller, published by D. C. Heath & Co., was selected as the text from which the state spelling contest would be taken. The name of this text is "Sanwick and Bacon."

5. It was moved and carried that the State President draw on each District President for \$5.00 from now on, to defray the expense of publishing a High School Bulletin.

## AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS, 1911.

1. A motion was made by Mr. Horton that the relay team may be selected by the District executive committee from the winners of any contest at the District meet. This motion prevailed.

2. Mr. Miller offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: "Resolved, That it shall take a two-thirds vote of the executive committee to amend the constitution and by-laws and that this change shall not go into effect till the next annual contest." The effect of this amendment is that the present printed rules will be binding for the year 1912.

3. Mr. Newton offered the following motion: Two subjects from each book designated for essays shall be proposed, and each contestant allowed to choose from these subjects the one upon which he shall write his essay—these subjects not to be announced until contestants are assembled for the event. This motion was carried.

4. The State President was instructed to select the four classics from the College Entrance Requirements for careful study. He has designated for 1911-12 the following: (1) Shakespeare's Macbeth, (2) Tennyson's Idylls of the King, (3) Washington's Farewell Address, and Webster's Bunker Hill Address, (4) Carlyle's Essay on Burns.

## BASEBALL, FOOTBALL, BASKETBALL.

5. All athletic events not enumerated among those for the state district meet will be regulated by the rules of the Public School Athletic League, except where our Georgia Association rules vary in regard to literary qualifications—that is, that the contestant must be a bona fide student of the high school department in good standing, carrying at least three studies, without more than one unit condition, and further, that no age limit be required, the administration of the rules to be under the direction of the several district executive committees. Second, that the contestant in football must have entered school not later than October 1st, and that for baseball the contestant must have entered not later than Feb. 1st.

## 6. RULES GOVERNING ATHLETIC BADGE COMPETITIONS.

The standards have been set as follows:

### Bronze Badge, Upper Grammar Grades.

Pull up (chinning on bar) 6 times; Standing broad jump, 6 ft. 6 in. Running high jump, 3 ft. 6 in. 100 yds. dash, 14 sec.

### Silver Badge, the High School Grades.

Pull up (chinning on bar), 9 times. Standing broad jump, 7 ft. Running high jump, 4 ft. 4 in. 100 yds. dash, 13 sec.; or 220-yds. run, 28 sec.

## CONDITIONS.

1. The Athletic Badge Tests may be held semi-annually in the fall before December 15th, or in the spring before June 1st.

2. The names of successful boys should be sent to the President of the State Executive Committee not later than June 1st, on official blanks. Another copy should be posted in the school.

3. Only those boys shall be admitted to the Athletic Badge Contest who are doing such work, that if continued without improvement, would entitle them to promotion at the end of the term. The principal of the school is to be sole judge of this and should take into consideration effort, proficiency and deportment.

4. In order to win a badge a boy must qualify in all four events in his class.

## RULES.

The following rules shall govern the final competition:

1. There shall be but one trial in chinning, one in the dashes, and three each in the jumps.

2. **Chinning.**—The boy shall extend himself to his full length before and after each pull-up, and shall be obliged to raise his body without kick, snap, jerk or swing to such a height as to bring his chin higher than the bar.

3. **Jumping.**—The rules of the Spaulding's Handbook No. 313, '09-'10, Rules XXVI and XXVII, pages 216, 217, shall govern this test, except that as there is no real contest, i. e., there is no striving for first, second, or third places, the finals shall be dispensed with. With reference to false starts, a competitor shall be penalized in accordance with Rule X, page 210 No. 313. The Handbook may be ordered from the Spaulding Store in Atlanta, price 10 cents).

4. **100 Yard Dash and 220 Yards Run.**—The general rules of competition as set forth in Handbook 313, pages 213, 214, shall govern this test, except there shall be no finals.

The State Committee will arrange for a trophy to the Grammar School in the state that qualifies the highest percentage of its enrolled boys in the three highest grades of the grammar school.

Another trophy will be given the high school in the state which qualifies the highest percentage of its boys in the Silver Test. If contest arises, an official test will be made under direction of the District Executive Committee.

Each school is expected to conduct its own tests under the rules. If assistance is desired, application should be made to the Executive Committee of the District. In cities the physical director will have general supervision of the Tests in the different schools.

The record of each school reporting will be published in the Annual Bulletin of the High School Association.

Badges will be furnished by the President on receipt of the semi-annual report and the cash payment.

If desired, Silver Badges may be awarded winners in the District track contests. Orders should be made by the Presidents of the District Associations and awarded by them under the rules. Official records must be kept and duplicate copy sent to the State President for the Annual Bulletin. The Gold Badges will be awarded to winners of the state "meet."

To give some idea of the interest in these standard tests in athletics in New York City, 6 741 bronze badges were won out of 47,540 pupils contesting; 308 high school badges were won out of 1130 pupils contesting. It is believed that the Georgia school will show a better high school record.

The bronze badges will cost 12 cents each, the silver badges will cost 25 cents each. These are net prices to the schools.

The object of these contests is to develop all-round athletes of a certain standard, not too high to be in reach of the many. The boys should practice throughout the year for the semi-annual contests.

## ATHLETICS FOR GIRLS.

We are desirous of encouraging wholesome athletics among the girls. To one who has watched the exciting class games among girls in the English schools and has seen the drills required by law in all the high schools of Great Britain, the almost total lack of physical training of our girls in the secondary schools is deeply to be deplored. I do not think we need push enter-school contests, but we should encourage enter-class contests and provide regular, systematic physical training under proper supervision. We will be glad to furnish Public School Athletic school pins in solid silver to the individual members of winning teams or class in folk dancing, class athletics and team games (including basketball played according to Spaulding's Official Rules for Women). These will be held under the Georgia Association rules for eligibility in athletic contests, and the general rules of the Public School Athletic League, Girls' Branch. Spaulding's Guide No. 314. Names of winners of silver pins will be printed each year in the Annual High School Bulletin.

## SCHOLARSHIPS.

The State Association entered into an agreement with the President of Brenau Conservatory of Music, by unanimous consent of executive committee, as follows:

This agreement entered into by and between Brenau College-Conservatory and J. S. Stewart representing the Eleven District High School Associations of Georgia, witnesseth:

First.—That said College-Conservatory has agreed to offer a \$60.00 scholarship in music to the winner in each high school association of Georgia to the successful performer in the music contests which are held annually in said associations. These scholarships are not transferable and must be presented within three years from the date of award. Further, Brenau College agrees during the same period to give a \$300.00 scholarship to the successful contestant in the State Contest participated in by the eleven successful contestants in the District Contest. The winner of the \$300.00 scholarship is not to receive benefit of the \$60.00 scholarship. The \$300.00 scholarship is to be applied on the board and tuition of the winner in Brenau College-Conservatory and will cover the entire expenses for board and one course in music for a period of one school year.

Second. That said J. S. Stewart acting for and with the consent of the eleven Presidents of the District High School Associations, agrees to conduct the said contest in a fair and impartial manner and to give due publicity to same and the award of said scholarship publicly at the close of said contest and furthermore that the scholarship so offered on the occasion of these contests shall be limited to Brenau College-Conservatory for the said period of five years.

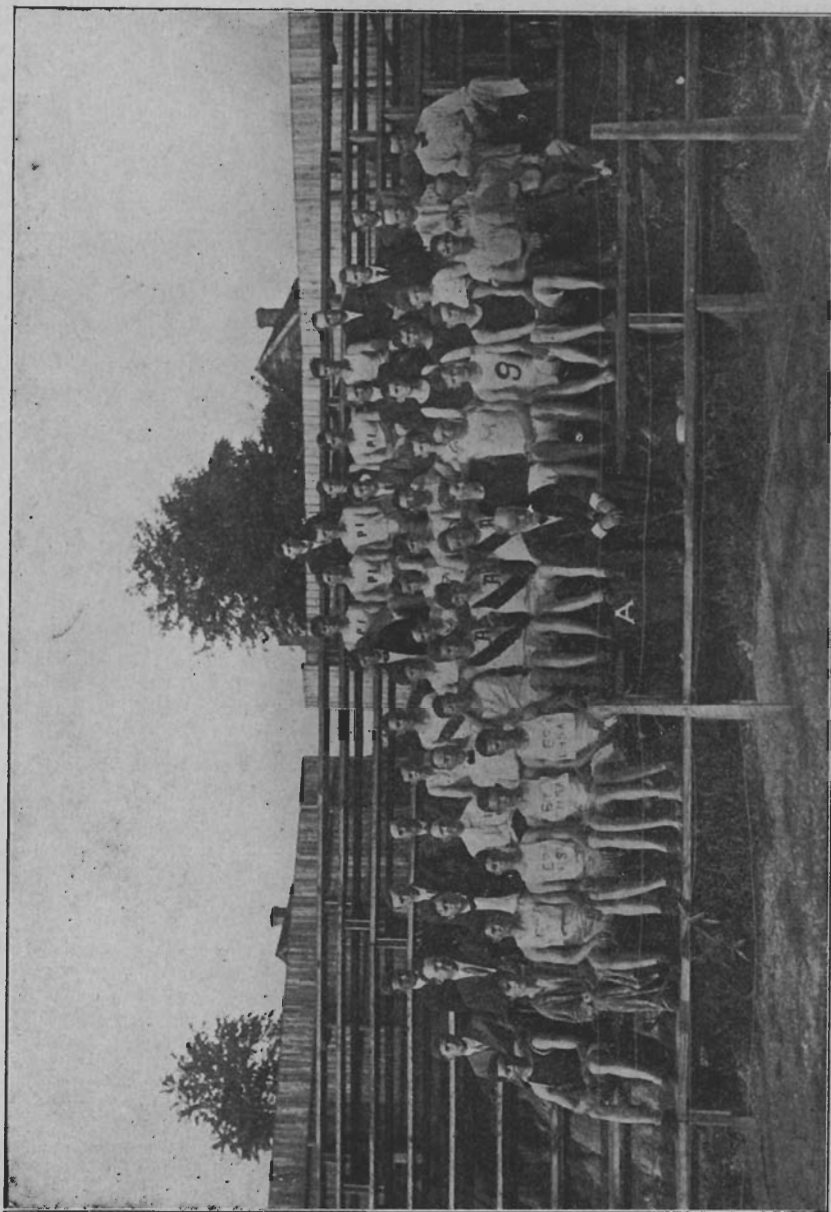

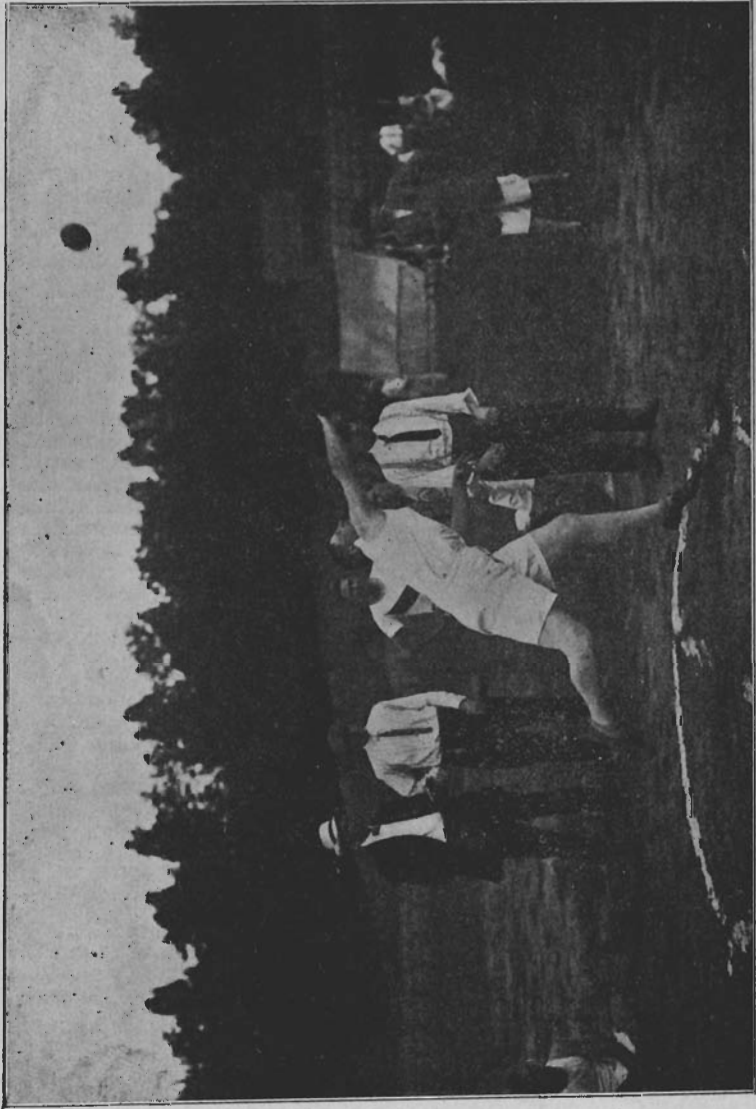
